

MONKS ELEIGH is a village and parish 8 miles north-east from Sudbury, 6 north-west from Hadleigh and 42 south-east from Lavenham station, situated on a tributary of the river Brett, in the Sudbury division of the county, Babergh hundred, Melford petty sessional of the county, Babergh hundred, Melford petty sessional division, Cosford union, Hadleigh county court district, rural deanery of Lavenham, archdeaconry of Sudbury and diocese of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich. The church of St. Peter is a building of flint and stone in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays with clerestory, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower with pinnacles containing a clock and 6 bells: there are remains of a piscina in the north aisle, and the entrance to the rood loft still north aisle, and the entrance to the rood loft still remains; the stained east window is a memorial to the Rev. James Connell M.A. rector, ob. 1879, besides other windows to this family. The organ was also presented by Mrs. Connell: the chancel was rebuilt and the vestry added about 1845: the interior was restored in 1867 at a cost of ξ_{300} , and affords 375 sittings: there is a memorial in the church to those from the village who died in the Great War, 1914-18. The register dates from the year 1557. The living is a rectory, net yearly value $\pounds 523$, with 17 acres of glebe and residence, in the

gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held since 1900 by the Rev. the Hon. Arthur Francis Northcote M.A. of New College, Oxford, hon. canon of St. Edmundsbury and rural dean of Lavenham. In the village is a Congregational chapel with a small burial ground attached. The yearly value of the Butfield charities is £4, derived from about 2½ acres of land in Lavenham. The Dean and Chapter of Canterbury are lords of the manor. The chief landowners are Felix Gage esq. and Thomas Morley esq. with some smaller owners. The soil is a rich loam; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, beans, clover, turnips and mangolds. The area is 2,099 acres; rateable value, £2,018; the population in 1921 was 510.
